BUCKHURST HILL PARISH COUNCIL 20 VEATS On. . .

n 2016 it will be 20 years since the creation of BHPC but it may surprise residents to hear that the legal basis for the creation of parish councils dates back to an Act of Parliament of 1894 (the Local Government Act). It could be said, therefore, in that context that BHPC is a relatively young parish council.

Increasing status of parish councils

Two major Acts of Parliament have increased the status and powers of parish councils since the 1894 Act. The Local Government Act of 1972, amongst other things, gave parish councils the right to be informed and consulted on planning applications for the development of land in the Parish. In 2016 this is still one of the single most important functions of BHPC with the planning committee being the most frequently meeting group in the council, as meetings take place fortnightly.

The Localism Act of 2011 has given parish councils, including BHPC, the bold new power to 'do anything that individuals generally may do' so long as it is not prohibited by any other Act of Parliament. This is also referred to as 'the general power of competence' and while parish councils are still feeling their way in relation to what this means for them in real terms it is undoubtedly a change that will significantly boost the status of parish councils and their ability to successfully represent local communities.

The 2011 Act also allowed for the formation of a Neighbourhood Plan by parish councils. In other words, it allows councils like BHPC to establish general planning policies for the development and use of land in their Parish. BHPC has already taken its first steps towards forming a Neighbourhood Plan for Buckhurst Hill and this is receiving councillors' ongoing attention through meetings and allocation of budget funding towards progressing the aim of a Neighbourhood Plan for Buckhurst Hill.

BHPC today

Responsibilities

BHPC is at the lowest tier of local government with Epping Forest District Council and then Essex County Council being above it in the hierarchy.

BHPC has a wide area of responsibility which includes allotments, two playgrounds, a ball Court, Roding Valley Recreation Ground, benches and 2 community halls.

Councillors and the office

BHPC is made up of the Office staff, at the head of which is the Parish Clerk, Kevin O'Brien, and 11 elected councillors whose current 4 year term expires in May 2016. The Chair of BHPC is Councillor Aniket Patel.

In terms of the division of work between the office and the councillors, broadly speaking, councillors make policy decisions and the office implements these on a day to day basis.

Work of a councillor – committees and sub-committees

The main work of the councillors is attending the meetings of BHPC including Full Council and they can also choose to be members of the various committees, which also meet regularly. The committees are Planning & Environment, Recreation & Community, Finance & Establishment and Neighbourhood Plan. There are also subcommittees of which councillors can be members these currently are the Website, Accommodation and

and these currently are the Website, Accommodation and Personnel sub-committees.

Each committee and sub-committee has its own chair and vice chair. Councillors are sent the meeting agendas and supporting documents so they can read these in advance of the meetings.

Meetings of BHPC are held in public and members of the public are permitted to speak in relation to any item on the agenda within the time allotted for members of the public.

Being a councillor – the experience

From the perspective of a councillor at BHPC, I can say that the work is varied, interesting and rewarding. Being a councillor gives me the opportunity to give something back to the community. The role of a parish councillor is one that has changed a great deal over time. In my view the role is destined to alter further still, due to the creation of the Localism Act 2011 but I believe that the changes will be positive ones that will allow even better representation of local communities.

Chairman's Report

s the sound of Christmas bells fade away and the green shoots of spring start to appear, the work of the Parish Council continues unabated.

Having successfully fought to protect Buckhurst Hill's status as a Large Village in the District Council's Green Belt Review, we continue to be actively involved in monitoring developments as the Review enters its second stage. Parish and District Councillors have attended numerous meetings, workshops etc to ensure that Buckhurst Hill's voice is heard. We will keep you advised on progress later this year.

Discussions continue with Essex County Council over our aspirations to extend the current usage of the Library. We are being supported in our plans by various Community Groups and are currently pulling all the ideas together in order to present a formal proposal in the near future.

We are also making significant progress in our aspiration to extend the opening hours of the Library. At the time of writing, our first group of volunteers are undergoing training and, as a consequence, we are looking to extend the opening hours later in the spring. So watch this space. It's also not too late to volunteer. If you would like an opportunity to meet people and support your local community in the process, then see the advertisement on the back page or contact the Parish Office for information.

I reported in the last Parish Magazine that we were bitterly disappointed that we had not secured the services of our own Police Community Support Officer (PCSO). However, with constant pressure by the Parish Council in recent weeks things have become much more positive and I can now report that fresh discussions with Essex Police have reached a point where a recruitment process will begin in the near future. Once appointed, the PCSO will be dedicated to patrolling Buckhurst Hill on a daily basis, as well as forging stronger links with local schools, Neighbourhood Watch coordinators, voluntary organisations etc.

Last month saw our most successful yet afternoon performance of the Disney Film "Big Hero 6", as part of our

Community Cinema programme, see photograph below. The Parish Office have already had enquiries about when the next film showing will take place and are looking into possible dates. So please keep a watchful eye out for information in the ensuing weeks. If you have any suggestions for future showings please let us know. As mentioned previously you can contact the Parish Office on office@buckhursthillpc.gov.uk or at the address 165 Queens Road Buckhurst Hill IG9 5AZ (shared with the Library).

Our "Winter Warmers" Older Persons Forum event, held on November 6th, was also acknowledged to be a resounding success. So much so that plans are already in place for the event to be run again later this year and our Clerk will shortly be attending a meeting to organise the 2016 event. It is intended that the event will be staged again during November and we will publish details as soon as they are known. There is an article on last November's event elsewhere in the Magazine.

Again in November, accompanied by other Parish and District Councillors and the Clerk, I was honoured to take part in the Wreath Laying and Remembrance events around the Parish organised by the Royal British Legion. Again there is a separate article elsewhere in the Magazine.

In the run-up to Christmas, I was firstly invited to join the Jewish community in celebrating Chanukah and the lighting of the Menorah at the top of Queens Road. Whilst on December 4th the annual "Christmas on Queens Road" event took place. This is an event organised in partnership with the Residents Society and the Buckhurst Hill Village Forum.

The event was opened by Barbara Blossom one of Buckhurst Hill's well known and senior citizens. Our MP Eleanor Laing was also in attendance, joining in with the hundreds of residents who came along and had a great time. I was also really pleased that over £1300 was raised for the Alzheimers Society, my chosen charity for this year.

To round things off on December 16th we ushered in Christmas with a joint carol service, organised with the Buckhurst Hill Baptist Church. The evening was much enjoyed by all who attended including representatives of other faith groups in Buckhurst Hill.

The evening was full of carol singing, reflection, mulled wine and mince pies and the collection raised a further £176 for the Alzheimers Society.

This is still a difficult time financially for local councils, as the amount of money available to us from Central Government has been reducing in real times in recent years. Notwithstanding, I am very proud that, despite this in Buckhurst Hill we have been able to freeze the precept for the fourth year in a row. Efficiencies made by this Council in recent years, mean that the Council can absorb the loss of funding and avoid passing the extra cost on to residents.

The current Council has made great strides over the last three and a half years, particularly in its efforts to draw the local community even closer together to the mutual benefit of all. It is therefore with optimism that I look forward in 2016 to us continuing to work together for the unique community of Buckhurst Hill.

Budget 2016/17

The Budget for 2016-2017 had been agreed, giving an anticipated expenditure of £588,221 and anticipated income of £76,492. The remaining income is partly taken from the Council's reserves and the remainder through the Precept which has been set at £351,867. This gives a Council Tax Band D equivalent charge of £68.89 meaning that the Local Council Tax for the parish of Buckhurst Hill has been frozen for the fourth successive year.

These are to name just a few.

So you can see that we have a busy and interesting year ahead of us in the Parish Office and it is time to roll up our sleeves and get stuck in. May I also take this opportunity on behalf of all the Parish Office Team, to wish you all a very happy Easter and I look forward to writing to you again in the summer.



Neighbourhood Watch

uring WWII, the civilian population had a hard time. There was rationing, shortages and genuine hardship quite apart from the bombing and all this was endured by, in the main, single parent families with the men in the services. Despite this, morale was always high and this was in great part due to the very high sense of community spirit that was generally felt. Everybody looked out for each other and helped each other. There was of course a specific reason for that and as the years have gone by that spirit has been to a large extent lost.

However, there is now a concerted attempt to resurrect some of that same community spirit and the modern name for this is Neighbourhood Watch. This involves small groups of citizens gathering together to help one another and look out for each other. There are a variety of ways in which this can operate, with the obvious being in regard to security. Safety of the premises should always be paramount and letting the others know when you are going to be away is a basic way in which we can all help each other. This is a nation-wide initiative and in the Epping Forest District there are many such NW groups with an overall District Committee helping to establish new groups and encouraging their development.

Some areas also have Neighbourhood Action Panels aimed at being concerned with issues of safety and security as they affect the average citizen and all this entirely volunteer force is working to help citizens with concerns over safety and security matters. Issues such as speeding, parking, abandoned vehicles and, of course, burglary are regularly addressed. Statistics have shown that the number of burglaries in premises in a Neighbourhood Watch area are considerably less than outside it. Mostly, it is found that premises that are broken into are not fitted with burglar alarms and, as the first positive action taken by home owners after a break-in is to fit such equipment, the way to prevention is to fit before the event. This is one of many positive actions constantly being promoted by these groups.

diagnosis of dementia can be very hard to take in. People who are diagnosed with the condition and their relatives can feel frightened and apprehensive. However, each family affected by dementia in our area can be reassured that help and support is available. The Alzheimer's Society offer a range of services that may be helpful. We understand that adapting to a new stage in your life can be difficult, but we always recommend that each family talk through any concerns with the Society before they become a problem or indeed, a crisis.

The Alzheimer's Society in Harlow, Epping Forest, and Uttlesford offer a range of services to anyone with a diagnosis of dementia and their carers. We offer information and a support service as well as a range of groups in West Essex. Don't be discouraged if you are not normally a "joiner" of groups and local activities. We always encourage people to keep an open mind, simply because many people who attend our services have said they do not feel they want to join groups, then they come along and meet with us and find that attending our groups can be a highlight in their week.

We provide a post-diagnostic support service, as well as our Community Dementia Support Team that offers information, guidance, signposting and support for people with dementia and their families throughout the course of the condition. We have Memory Cafes in Loughton, Harlow, and Saffron Walden and are also opening a new café in Waltham Abbey on

23rd February. Our cafes are informal and people can drop in at their own convenience to obtain information and advice on strategies about how to live well with dementia. The cafes also offer information for the general community and those working in dementia care. We also offer Carers Support Groups, activity groups and our trademark Singing for the Brain services across the West Essex area, along with a service delivered in partnership with Age UK called Dementia Connections which provides short term support to enable people with dementia to continue hobbies and interests in their local community.

PUMP HUNT FOR SEWAGE STATION

- Thames Water to take on the responsibility of 4,000 sewage pumping stations from property owners and managers
- Utility will take over electricity and maintenance costs under new legislation, potentially saving customers thousands of pounds
- Firm appeals for help tracking 1,800 'missing' stations

Thames Water is appealing to customers to help identify privately owned sewage pumping stations.

The utility, which serves 15 million customers across London and the Thames Valley, will take responsibility for around 4,000 pumping in October 2016, but needs to track down 1,800 currently off its radar.

New legislation means sewage pumping stations, which power wastewater away from properties and out into the public sewer pipe network, currently owned and maintained by customers will become legally owned and operated by the local water company.

The pumping stations are found in all shapes and sizes, and can be in places where there are a number of properties needing to connect to the public sewer network. Customers will know they have one as they'll be paying to maintain and power them.


Jerry White, of Thames Water, said: "This is really good news for customers. We'd urge anyone who thinks they may have one to get in touch so we can check they are eligible for the transfer of ownership. In some cases, as well as electricity savings, maintaining and replacing pumps can cost thousands of pounds so it's an excellent deal for them.

"We believe we know where approximately half of the stations we need to take over are, but really need help to find the other 1,800. Please get in touch if you think this applies to you and we can take on the responsibility forever."

Crossroads Improvement

ood things do come to those who wait and in this instance Essex County Council are delighted to tell residents that work will at last start on the 4-way crossing for the Palmerston Road/Loughton Way/Roding Lane/Albert Road junction. The work is expected to start around mid-March and take 4 weeks to complete.

Councillor Neville Wright said: "The improvements to this junction are a much needed road safety feature for Buckhurst Hill residents, especially for parents taking their children to school or nursery or just the general flow of pedestrians crossing to or from the tube station or Queens Road shops."

County Councillor Valerie Metcalfe added: "Essex Highways are hoping it might also help improve the flow of traffic crossing at this major intersection. Whilst appreciating that there may be some disruption whilst work is proceeding, they hope to keep any inconvenience down to a minimum. The aim is therefore to carry out the majority of the work during the schools' Easter Holidays."

The total cost of the crossing is around £160,000, partly financed by the Epping Forest District Local Highways Panel which aims to use its limited funds on local improvements that residents have been requesting.
